# Human Trafficking Defined

Trafficking in Persons is the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person, for the purpose of exploitation.

Exploitation shall include, at a minimum, the <u>exploitation of the prostitution of others</u> or other forms of sexual exploitation, forced labour or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery, servitude or the removal of organs.

# Sexual Exploitation Defined

A practise by which person(s) achieve sexual gratification or financial gain or advancement through the abuse of a person's sexuality by abrogating that person's human right to dignity, equality, autonomy and physical and mental wellbeing. (Edwards, 1991)

Key element: Vulnerability

Vulnerability is a situation in which the person concerned has no real or acceptable alternative but to submit to the abuse involved.


Start of exploitation:


- Voluntarily (position and experience)

- Forced start and continuation (possibility and willingness)



# From intelligence-led policing to predictive policing

The prostitution carrousel routes used to facilitate sexual exploitation, lead to interesting questions on the nature and extend of the crimes and the persons involved as well as consequences for its victims.

At the same time it also provides us with useful information and insight on trafficking routes and existing crime connections and involvement of others.

### Research design

Step 1: Identification of victims in destination countries (information from victims and police on background, experiences and travels).

Step 2: Hot spot detection in source countries (i.e. Huszártelep /Nyiregyháza, Hungary and Madesja/Sliven, Bulgaria).

- Step 3: Profiling and identification of possible victims by cyber-ethnographic observations in hot-spot region via the internet.
- Step 4: Monitor and provide insight in movement (transit type and countries) and other changes.
- Step 5: Geo- visualization of recognizable patterns and start with start (European) crime mapping.
- Step 6: Assess the possibility of the use of predictive policing.
