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Foreword

Fundamental changes have occurred over the past 15 years in the European Union's security architecture: the Treaty of Lisbon, a new internal security strategy with renewed institutions and mechanisms, a policy cycle on international serious and organised crime, just to name a few. These developments are having a significant impact on how the EU tackles internal security and its external aspects via law enforcement training.

Today's diverse patterns of transnational crime can only be countered by more effective cross-border cooperation with police, customs, border guards and other authorities working closely together. Unless those authorities are properly trained and unless there is sufficient mutual trust, cooperation will not be as effective.

The challenges are great and should not be underestimated. This is the mission the European Police College (CEPOL) contributes to.

CEPOL is responsible for a large number of activities implemented primarily by the network of national training institutions of the EU Member States. Our collective commitment is the driving power and the guarantee that our courses, seminars, conferences or exchange programmes are characterised by qualitative learning. Thousands of participants have confirmed the high quality of our trainings year after year. In 2015, over 83 residential courses and 59 webinars will be implemented. The 2015 annual work programme has been built with input from the agency's network and stakeholders, resulting in topical and focused activities designed to meet the needs of Member States and the overall requirements stemming from the EU internal security strategy. The portfolio of activities developed for 2015 is aligned with priorities deriving from the EU Internal Security Strategy addressing public security threats including their external aspects. Activities will cover policing issues ranging from leadership to law enforcement techniques and EU cooperation to counter-terrorism. Learning products are designed to facilitate the development of competencies, the sharing of knowledge and good practices and to contribute to the development of a common European law enforcement culture... Furthermore, 2015 will see the launch of the European joint master programme (EJMP), the first EU academic programme aimed at addressing common challenges of police cooperation in the framework of internal security.

Approaches to learning

The European Police College has been working with national training institutes in the EU for more than 10 years, with the aim of strengthening police cooperation through learning.

CEPOL training and learning activities encourage development of competencies vital for the internal security of the Union, exchange of knowledge and experience and, most importantly, offer the opportunity for networking and the development of long-lasting professional networks.

CEPOL employs a multi-layered approach to learning, with different activities complementing one another. CEPOL's blended learning tools include:

- Residential courses and seminars;
- Webinars (online seminars);
- E-learning modules;
- Bilateral exchanges through the European police exchange programme;
- Common curricula.

To ensure quality of learning, CEPOL conducts a two-step evaluation of all residential activities, using a version of the Kirkpatrick model adapted to CEPOL's needs.

In addition to its residential activities, CEPOL offers several e-learning tools. Participants can choose from online modules, webinars and platforms for online communities. These tools allow law enforcement professionals to increase their knowledge, share their experiences and develop their competences. Whether applied in self-paced, individually directed learning or as a blended add-on to residential training, police officers can benefit from interactive learning and can easily access the learning content again at any time from any location. Demand for online learning has been steadily growing. In 2015, CEPOL will implement 62 webinars organised around nine priority topics for the security of the citizens in the European Union.

Residential activities are delivered for highly specialist training. Online learning supports these activities. It is used to raise awareness and to address ad hoc training needs (webinars).

As police training and education is fundamental for excellent policing, it is imperative to make sure that national police training on cross-border issues covers the same topics and ensures at least a similar level of instruction and training outcomes in all Member States. The objective of the common curricula is to contribute to the harmonisation of police training with the Member States while respecting national sovereignty with regard to the organisation and implementation of police training and education programmes. Within a wider scope, they aim at supporting the objectives of the Stockholm programme and its related actions.

The main objective of the programme is to enhance police cooperation on combating crime and increase cooperation on police training. It is based on enhanced mobility, mutual learning, exchange of experiences and good practices. The programme itself provides participants with

the opportunity to create a network of colleagues and to familiarise themselves with working methods of other countries.

All activities are supported by e-Net, CEPOL's online learning platform. Though e-Net, users have access to tools and resources that support and prolong the learning experience.

EU POLICY CYCLE 2014-2017

The EU policy cycle highlights the most severe threats to internal security faced by Member States: 'Serious and organised crime is an increasingly dynamic and complex phenomenon and remains a significant threat to the safety and prosperity of the EU. Transnational crime can only be countered by cross-border cooperation with police, customs, border guards and other authorities working together. Unless those authorities are properly trained, and unless there is sufficient mutual trust, cooperation will not be as effective. Against this background, the strategic and operational goals in the fight against organised and serious cross-border crime and terrorism need to be underpinned by coherent, recognised and high-quality training in specialised and centrally prioritised areas for EU law enforcement officers involved in transnational cooperation'.

In order to meet the training needs of law enforcement officers as highlighted by the EU serious and organised crime threat assessment (SOCTA), CEPOL will organise many activities in 2015 to assist Member States in contributing to the preparation of the full EU policy cycle 2014–17. These training activities will incorporate the expertise of key players, such as the Council of the EU, the European Commission, Europol and operational action plan (OAP) drivers of the current cycle.

COUNTER-TERRORISM

Preventing terrorism is a primary objective of the EU's security strategy and, across the EU, Member States work together to counter terrorist threats at a strategic level. Countering terrorism today is a complex endeavour. Heightened political turmoil, combined with socioeconomic pressures, creates conditions conducive to armed militant activity. Extremist groups are taking advantage of a steady supply of weapons, foreign fighters, porous borders and social media tools. Today's counter-terrorism efforts must understand the value and limits of recent experience, as terrorists have become an adaptive and highly motivated adversary.

In 2015, CEPOL's portfolio of activities in the field of counter terrorism included residential trainings, a webinar and an updated common curriculum. Topics covered threat assessment methodologies, different aspects of terrorism (such as terrorist financing), implications for border management, impact and use of media technologies, etc.

EU POLICE AND JUDICIAL COOPERATION AND NETWORKS

CEPOL's activities in the field of EU cooperation cover a range of topics, from issues affecting the security of citizens to police and judicial cooperation, as well as law enforcement cooperation tools. The activities provide a deeper understanding of the structures, instruments and approaches available at the European level. In particular, CEPOL's seminars on Joint Investigation Teams (JITs) continue to attract very high interest among police, prosecutors and the judiciary because of their focus on practical issues arising from real case studies. These seminars aim to create synergies and at reinforce mutual trust and cooperation between prosecutors, judges and senior police officers involved in leading/operating JITs. The activities also look at the concept and the functioning of JITs from a leadership perspective. Lectures, panel discussions, workshops and case studies have supported the learning process.

Many of the activities in the field rely on the cooperation between EU agencies, in particular on the provision of expertise.

European Police Exchange Programme

The programme allows participants to spend a week with a counterpart in their hosting country. These exchanges promote trust and cooperation between law enforcement officers from across Europe and beyond.

The programme fulfils one of CEPOL's key objectives — developing a European police culture. Exchanges increase appreciation of different cultures, remove biases and break down barriers. The exchange programme is open to law enforcement officers and trainers from all EU Member States, EU candidate countries, Western Balkan and European Eastern Partnership countries. It is not only limited to police authorities, but also includes other law enforcement agencies under the 'inter-agency' segment.

In 2015, the programme has been further refined to better reflect requirements deriving from the Stockholm programme priorities, the EU policy cycle and requests from Member States. Thematic areas of study were better synchronised with CEPOL's overall training portfolio. This alignment of thematic areas enabled the exchange programme to complement CEPOL's other training options, contributing to the agency's multi-layered approach to learning.

2015 European police exchange programme features six segments:

- general segment for police officers;
- senior police leader segment;
- trainers segment;
- researchers segment;
- inter-agency segment;
- ENP-WB segment.

The European police exchange programme is fully financed from the general budget of CEPOL. Budget availability determines the ability of the European police exchange programme to meet a continuously increasing demand.

The exchange visits will be done on a bilateral basis and will last 6 days.
